Cardiologist

Cardiologists are doctors who diagnose, treat, and manage heart and blood vessel diseases. They work in hospitals, clinics, medical offices, and private practices. They treat chest pain, high blood pressure and heart failure, as well as problems with heart valves, blood vessels and other heart and vascular issues. They can order tests like electrocardiograms, echocardiograms, CTs (computed tomography), CMR (cardiac magnetic resonance imaging) and nuclear imaging to find out what's wrong. With diagnosis, they can prescribe medicine, advise on healthier habits, or perform cardiac catheterization. If surgery is needed, they can refer to a cardiothoracic surgeon.



How Do I Become a Cardiologist?

PROJECTED JOB **GROWTH RATE IS** 5% BY 2033

Cardiologists must earn a bachelor's degree, ideally with a focus on life sciences and then attend **medical school** and obtain a Doctor of Medicine (MD) degree and pass the USMLE (United States Medical Licensing Examination). They then must complete a **residency program** in internal medicine, usually lasting three years and enroll in a cardiology fellowship program for an additional three years of specialized training before obtaining board certification in cardiology through the American Board of Internal Medicine (ABIM).

What Does a Cardiologist Do?



- Order tests such as EKG's, echocardiograms, and stress tests
- Prescribe medications
- Perform procedures such as angioplasty & stenting



- Advise on lifestyle modifications like diet & exercise.
- **Educate** patients
- Conduct research

A Professional Account

Dr. Matthew Cox, M.D. Cardiologist at Olean Medical Group gives insight on a career in Cardiology.

What is the most rewarding part of your journey?

"A lot of what we do in Cardiovascular Medicine is to deal with medical conditions that are "silent killers" and treating them doesn't really make the patients "feel" any better. However, occasionally patients will have a severely debilitating condition that responds very well to a particular therapy, and they are incredibly grateful when they feel that they almost have their life back because of some type of treatment or intervention you performed."

What is the most challenging?

"In this day and age of the internet and social media there is so much information available to patients, but unfortunately, they do not always have the proper training to discern what is factual information and they will make medical decisions based off of false or only partially true information. As a provider, it is sometimes very challenging to get patients to adhere to the standard of care because they found something contradictory on the internet."

What do you wish you knew back in school that you know now?

"I wish I knew how I would spend more time as a provider in front of a computer and on the phone charting and talking to insurance companies rather than having the majority of my time spent with patients."


